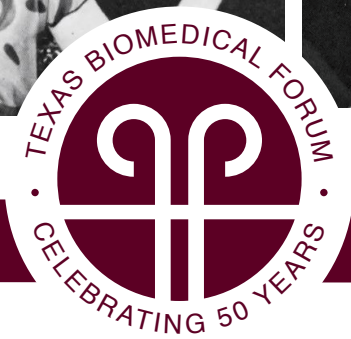

LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT: 50 Years of Women Supporting Science

Fifty years ago, **Tena Gorman**, **Ruth Eileen Sullivan** and **Dottie Block** founded the Texas Biomedical Forum. These three ladies were sitting around a table and envisioned a women's group to support Southwest Foundation for Research and Education, now known as the Texas Biomedical Research Institute. They enlisted a group of like-minded women and that is not much different than our Forum today. As I reflect on the cover photo of this newsletter, and in many recent conversations with Tena, I'm in awe of this powerful group of women and the amazing organization that they started. Their first big fundraiser was a picnic--a picnic that would ultimately evolve into the gala of today.

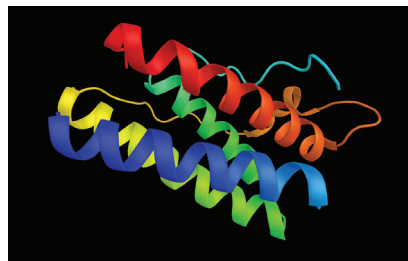

NEW GRANT FUNDS ANTI-AGING STUDY

The William and Ella Owens Medical Research Foundation has awarded Texas Biomed Associate Professor **Marcel Daadi, Ph.D.**, with a grant of more than \$100,000 to test a promising FDA-approved drug for reversing age-related cognitive decline and memory deficits observed in aged baboons.

“We are truly excited about this opportunity to use aged baboons in our study because they develop human-like, age-related decline in cognitive and motor performances,” Dr. Daadi said. “With this drug, we hope to develop a therapeutic intervention to enhance the bioenergetics and function of our brain cells and improve the general health and well-being of our aged population.”

RESEARCHERS FIND NEW MUTATION IN THE LEPTIN GENE



Leptin, the “satiety hormone” made by adipose cells that helps to regulate energy balance by inhibiting hunger. Opposed by the actions of the hormone ghrelin, the “hunger hormone.”

The global obesity epidemic is so far-reaching it now has an overarching name: globesity. Texas Biomed Staff Scientist **Raul Bastarrachea, M.D.**, is part of a team that discovered a new mutation in the gene that regulates the key hormone suppressing hunger called *leptin*. This new mutation could help researchers understand why people develop excess of body fat. Dr. Bastarrachea’s research is aimed at helping tackle metabolic disorders like cardiovascular disease and diabetes which are fueled by obesity and impact millions of people around the world.

“We keep learning more and more about the role of fat in normal-weight people,” Bastarrachea said. “By researching what goes wrong when genes don’t code correctly for the production of leptin, we are coming closer to answers that could help millions of people with metabolic disorders.”

TEXAS BIOMED WINS NEW FUNDING FOR IMPORTANT HEART DISEASE STUDY

The Strong Heart Study of American Indians (SHS) is one of the largest and longest-running epidemiological and genetic studies involving Native Americans in the country, involving more than 7,600 participants since 1988. 30 years ago, NIH researchers began looking at particular risk factors for heart disease in the Native American population. SHS scientists and their collaborators across the country found Native Americans have some of the highest rates of type 2 diabetes and cardiovascular disease among people of various ethnicities.

Texas Biomed in San Antonio, Texas, has just been awarded a \$3 million grant to continue its work on this important project.



TEXAS BIOMED ANNOUNCES NEW FACULTY MEMBER

Texas Biomedical Research Institute has recruited a new faculty member to San Antonio. Assistant Professor **Diako Ebrahimi, Ph.D.**, will establish his own research program in quantitative biology related to the fields of viral and cancer immunology and also collaborate on research projects with Texas Biomed Faculty. Dr. Ebrahimi’s recruitment is part of the Institute’s 10-year strategic plan to recruit nearly 20 new faculty members and double the size of the Institute.

“My goal is to develop a collaborative and cross-disciplinary research program that combines multi-omic quantitative analysis with targeted experimental strategies to identify and answer key questions in the fields of viral and cancer immunity,” Ebrahimi shared. “Currently, large amounts of data are being generated across disciplines to study complex biological processes. However, cross-disciplinary quantitative skills are urgently needed to analyze and interpret these massive datasets and direct future targeted experiments.”



TEXAS BIOMED HIRES NEW PRIMATE CENTER RESEARCHER

The newest Professor at Texas Biomed, **Mahesh Mohan, D.V.M., M.S., Ph.D.**, is an HIV researcher who focuses on what happens at the sub-cellular level when a person is infected with the virus that causes AIDS. Recently, he has branched out into studying the use of cannabinoids (a psychoactive component in marijuana) to manage the inflammation that often accompanies an HIV infection. His research could lead to new insights into using cannabinoids to treat other illnesses as well.

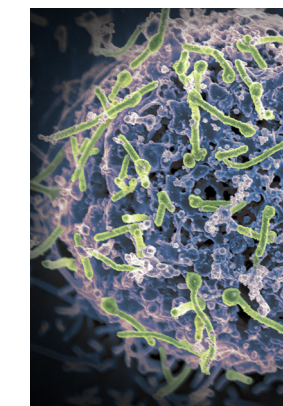
“HIV infection results in chronic inflammation. We are working to identify where the changes occur and try to reverse the problem with new feasible pharmacological approaches,” Mohan said.



EBOLA THERAPIES AND VACCINES SHOW PROMISE

In August 2019, human clinical trials were halted in the current Ebola epidemic that has claimed more than 1800 lives in Africa. The findings resulted in the discontinuation of two of the drugs in the trial. Future patients will be randomly assigned to receive either REGN-EB3 (Regeneron) or mAb114 (Ridgeback Biotherapeutics) in an extension phase of the study. Texas Biomed scientists in the Institute’s Biosafety Level 4 contract research program conducted preclinical testing of three of the four compounds in the trial, working with Regeneron, the Biomedical Advanced Research and Development Authority (BARDA), and Mapp Pharmaceuticals.

“Preclinical data showed each of these compounds to be efficacious to some degree,” explained **Ricardo Carrion, Jr., Ph.D.**, Professor and Director of Texas Biomed’s BSL-4 Contract Research Program. “We are motivated by the promise of several compounds and are happy to see that patients are recovering, as that is always the goal of our science – to positively impact human lives.”



STUDENT TOURS PROMISE INSPIRATION FOR TEXAS STUDENTS

This year **Mary Labatt**, **Angie Light**, and **Muffin Moorman** will coordinate science presentations and facility tours for dozens of interested high schoolers and their teachers. Our goal is to provide inspiring exposure to the exciting work of Texas Biomed, and to offer a broader vision of the possibilities in scientific research to these young people. We are especially excited to increase awareness of the generous grants available for science education in local schools.

2019/2020 FORUM GRANTS

The Texas Biomedical Forum Grants program supports the Texas Biomedical Research Institute by raising money to enable the scientists to launch high risk/ high reward pilot studies. Over the years, the Forum has awarded over \$3 million to the scientists for these “seed grants” that has resulted in major research awards of \$73 million from other funders such as the NIH. In one such example of the success of these pilot studies, a 2017 Forum grant made to Professor **Larry Schlesinger, M.D.**, Assistant Professor **Smita Kulkarni, Ph.D.**, and Staff Scientist **Eusondia Arnett, Ph.D.**, yielded a \$536,250 two-year NIH grant to study how HIV alters the formation of lesions in the lungs that make patients more susceptible to TB infection. This impactful research was made possible by the generous donors of the Forum Grants program.

This year, to honor the Forum’s 50th Anniversary, we are thrilled to announce two very special sponsors who have provided the Forum and its donors a tremendous incentive to give through the pledge of a challenge match of up to \$100,000, each. The James W. Gorman Family Foundation, in honor of **Tena Gorman**, the Mays Family Foundation, in honor of **Peggy Mays**, have generously agreed to match all Grants gifts, dollar for dollar, which offers us the opportunity to triple our impact on the Texas Biomedical Research Institute. We are immensely grateful to these Foundations for demonstrating their leadership and generosity through this matching challenge.

SCIENCE AWARD UPDATE

Dr. Jamie Holbrook of St. Mary’s Hall was a recipient of a Forum Education Grant last year, and recently shared an update on their work. “As of today we have purchased the equipment (stereoscopes and camera), assembled the equipment, practiced stereoscope viewing skills, bred the zebrafish, and are analyzing the normal development process of our embryos. Our investigation of environmental contaminants on the embryos will occur in October to coincide with our curriculum. Below is a photo of a student using a new stereoscope purchased with grant money and another photo showing the zebrafish embryo that he is viewing. I look forward to keeping you updated as this amazing learning experience unfolds!”
